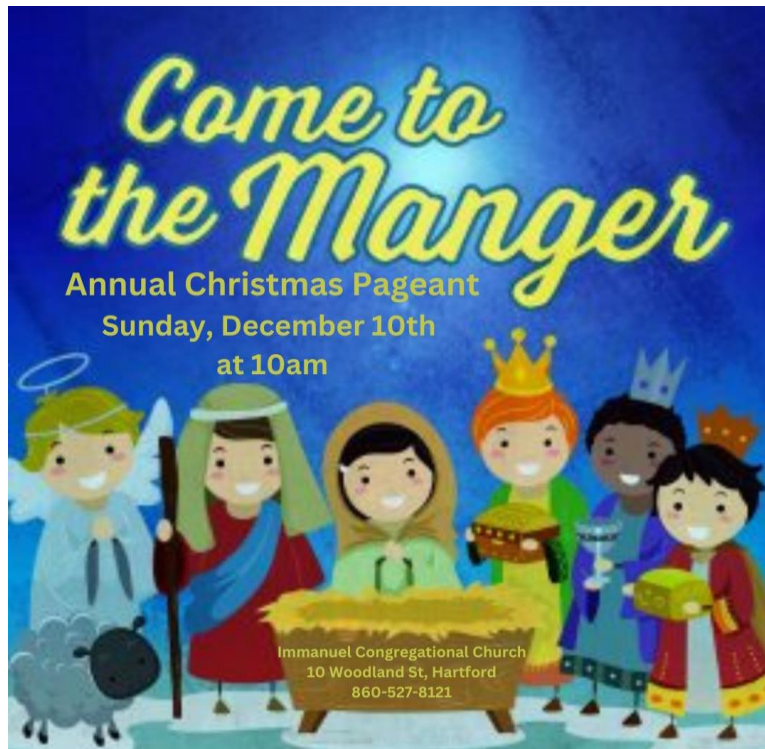

Stewardship Testimony from Jim Kew

It's In Our Hands

21 years ago, I was laid off by my employer. I didn't need sympathy, I was ready to go. But I wasn't prepared for my sudden increase in free time. I decided I should use it to do something good for my church, the Simsbury First Church of Christ. I went to talk with our interim Pastor, Roger Nicholson, a long-time member of Immanuel, who also served as an interim in this church. Roger was one of the kindest, most compassionate, and sensible people I have ever met. I asked him how I could help. He immediately said, "Well we need a Stewardship Chairperson." That wasn't the answer I was looking for!! But I couldn't say no to Roger.



I clearly remember the letter the church received from Roger, during that stewardship campaign which had the following testimonial: "I have tithed all my life and I never wanted for anything." How many of us can say that? I can't.

I suspect Roger's tithe was the Biblical 10% of his income, although today some say we should give 5% to our church and 5% to other good works. Now I can say I am tithing now that I am done with family and college tuition expenses. But that's not what Roger said. He didn't say I tithed in the good years and did the best I could in the difficult years. He made a life-long commitment to give 10% of his income back to God, he paid it off the top, it gave him great joy, and he didn't regret it.

I don't have to tell you that this church is having financial challenges. A lot of people have worked tirelessly to find solutions to our financial problems. We are making progress but still likely to have a budget with a large deficit. We have a lot of significant expenses. I am going to throw some numbers at you with the hope that they will help you understand the problem better. This year we are on track to spend \$56K for insurance for this building (its replacement cost is assessed at \$14 million). It will cost us \$83,000 for electricity and heat. Medical benefits, pension and workers comp insurance for our staff will cost \$91K. Administrative costs for phone, internet, website, copy machine, etc. will add another \$44K for a total of \$274K. That is before we pay the staff, our largest expense. It's expensive to worship in this beautiful sanctuary, to have dedicated, competent staff, to hear a beautiful choir, and to support all the outreach this church does every day.

We've squeezed every expense in our budget and we have had to ask the staff to make significant sacrifices. We are reducing contributions to their pensions and requiring them to pay for a portion of their benefits, among other things – decisions none of us are happy about.

How did we get here? In 2015, our donations totaled \$415K, 63% of our total expenses. Over the next 7 years, our expenses increased by \$224K, principally to do right by our employees, but donations went up only \$2K to \$417K. So, donations were then only 47% of total expenses. See the problem?

In most churches, pledges and donations pay for 70% - 85% of expenses. There are 128 of us who pledged financial support in 2023. Our average pledge was \$3,300. But I can tell you that when I came to Immanuel about 12 years ago, our average pledge was about \$3,700, so we have moved in the wrong direction. Our expenses are \$6,000 per contributing family. You might conclude that the problem is us - and the solution can also be us. The future of this church we all love is in our hands.

In the last six months, we have focused on cutting expenses. It is time now for us to reach into our pocketbooks and take the future of this church into our hands. A healthy church needs a high % of people who pledge. If you are not now pledging, Immanuel needs your help. Please make a financial pledge now.

If you made a pledge in 2023, we are asking you to consider giving 1% more of your income than you are now giving. Earlier this year, when we realized we had a financial problem, we collectively gave \$135K more for 2023 than in 2022. Can we do that again? On that subject, I have good news. As of this week, 32 people of the 36 people who pledged increased the amount. That's remarkable!

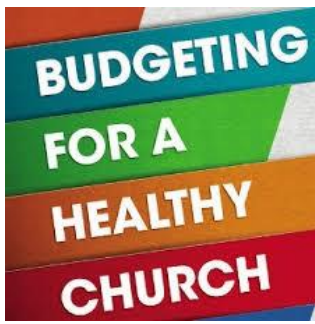
I have to tell you that as I was writing these words, I found this letter dated October 2003 from Roger Nicholson. In it, he told me that throughout his career he gave half his pledge to his home church and half to the church he was serving. He went on to tell me that since the church had called a new pastor, he would pay his pledge for 2003 but would not be pledging for 2004.

I consider finding that letter a sign that Roger is with us. He is here cheering us on, reminding us that "He tithed all his life and never wanted for anything".

He gave joyfully and without regret. We can do that too. The only question that remains – will we? We are well on our way. Let's do it, because the future of Immanuel is in our hands! Amen.

And...An Update from the Board of Finance about 2023 Pledges

As we conclude a challenging 2024 budget process, we still need your help to cross the goal line. The actual results of 2023 are extremely important. A 2023 surplus would roll into the 2024 Budget as an additional source of income. Conversely, a 2023 deficit would roll into the 2024 Budget as an additional expense to be covered by 2024 income. Please complete the payment of your 2023 pledge before 12/31/23. If all pledges are collected, we have a good chance of ending the year with a surplus. We hope 2023 results will make it a little easier to balance the 2024 budget.



Congregational Conversations about Immanuel's 2024 Budget

Over this year, Immanuel's expenses and income sources have been carefully reviewed by two different budget task forces, as well as by our staff and several of our standing committees, and finally by Church Council and the Board of Finance. As most of you know, we have been spending more than our income for several years and taking more out of our endowment than is recommended to pay our operating expenses. We have determined that we need to work toward a balanced budget through increases in our income and making carefully considered reductions in our expenses. We have faced some really difficult decisions regarding reducing our expenses.

We are working toward a balanced budget for 2025 and some of the things which we are considering directly impact our staff compensation and benefits. As we work toward finalizing a budget for 2024, the church leadership is wanting and needing to share our thinking and to hear from you your priorities and ideas. We know that the considerations are challenging and some of the ideas for expense reduction are painful. So we are scheduling several gatherings to share with you and to hear from you.

We have scheduled three listening and discussion sessions in December and January:

- **Saturday, December 9 at 9:30am**
- **Sunday, December 17 immediately after worship**
- **Wednesday, January 12 at 7pm (via Zoom)**

Please plan to attend one (or several) of these important gatherings.

8 ways to have a "Greener" Christmas.

Christmas does not have to be a burden to the planet. With a little effort and imagination, we can reduce the environmental impact of the holiday season.

1. **Give services** rather than material gifts...Such as, massages, a meal at a favorite restaurant, tickets to the movies or sporting events, gift cards, museum passes, music, art or dancing lessons, offers to babysit, wash cars or walk dogs etc.
2. **Eliminate extensive gift giving** by drawing names.
3. **Reconsider the impact of gift wrapping.** This holiday, Americans will use over 4,000,000 tons of gift wrap and shopping bags. That is almost 6,000 football fields and 20,000,000 trees every year.
 - Buy recycled, paper or reusable fabric wraps online.
 - Don't buy wrapping paper or cards with glitter on them as they cannot be recycled. This also includes tissue paper, which is usually too thin to be recycled and is usually made from metallic dyes.
 - Consider using gift bags that can be used from year to year.
4. **Regifting** can be environmentally sound, but the regifting has to be done with care as not to offend the original gift giver.
5. **Make handmade greeting cards.** Store-bought cards consume a lot of natural resources for a throwaway item. The amount of Christmas cards used in the United States every year could fill a football field 10 stories high! Children's artwork is always a fun way to make your cards and grandparents love them!
6. **Buy a live tree** instead of an artificial one. Live trees, while growing, absorb CO² and it is estimated that 90% of trees are recycled into mulch. Artificial trees depend on fossil fuels to produce and are not compostable. Buy your live tree at a local tree farm to avoid the transportation impact.

7. **Switch to LED Christmas lights.** When it comes to eco-friendly Christmas decorations, LEDs are far better than twinkling incandescent lights because they use 80% less energy. Switch to solar powered lights for outdoors.

8. **Remember the true meaning of Christmas.** Ask yourself what is truly important. Is it the gifts, excess food, decorations, and sparkly clothes, or is it spending time with loved ones, reflecting on the year past, being grateful for what you have and remembering the Hope that the Christ Child continues to bring us?

Update on the Sale of 350 and 360 Farmington Avenue Buildings

A Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday November 12, 2023. The purpose of the meeting was to accept the Council’s recommendation (under the advisement of the Long-Term Sustainability Committee) to enter into a contract and proceed with the sale of 350 Farmington Avenue. After some discussion that centered on closing costs and the use of sales proceeds, the Council’s recommendation was approved.

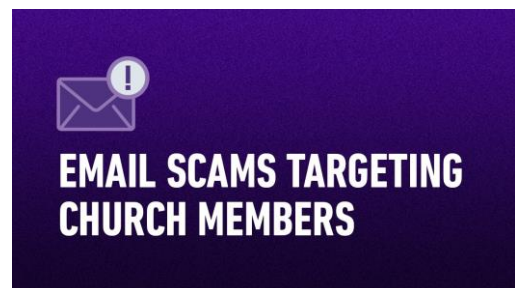
The Meeting was a culmination of 18 months of work by the Long-Term Sustainability Committee. The Committee’s charge was to find ways to eliminate the Church’s deficit spending and to improve its financial stability. It was determined that the largest contributor to the Church’s deficit was 350 and 360 Farmington. As a result, the Committee chose to focus on those assets.

After determining that retaining the properties was not a viable option from either a financial or a staffing perspective, the Committee proceeded with a plan to divest of the properties. The plan was developed through meetings and conversations with local nonprofits, existing tenants, commercial brokers, surveyors, real estate appraisers, real estate attorneys, and other stakeholders.

The two properties were formally listed for sale in May 2023 with 350 listed for \$350,000 and 360 listed for \$600,000. The 360 listing includes both the main building and the carriage house theater. Since that time, there have been over 20 showings with most interest coming from nonprofits and small professional businesses.

350 Farmington Avenue is being sold to Platt 350 LLC for \$300,000. The sponsor is Laura B. Platt, a West Hartford attorney who specializes in elder law and probate work. After completing renovations, she plans to move her practice from leased space to the property. This is a cash sale with no financing contingency.

The closing is expected to occur in December with the amount of net proceeds estimated at \$245,000. The Church agreed to a \$25,000 credit to cover inspection report issues (primarily the discovery of an abandoned underground oil tank and a deteriorating roof). Real estate commissions, legal, and other administrative costs are estimated at \$30,000. The net proceeds will be deposited in the Church’s endowment. 360 Farmington remains listed for sale at \$600,000.

A Transformative Journey: Youth Group's Eye-Opening Experience with Hands on Hartford

Our youth group recently embarked on a profound and eye-opening journey with Hands on Hartford as part of their Fall retreat, an experience that left us with hearts full of compassion and a renewed commitment to making a positive impact on the lives of those less fortunate.



The day began with a tour of the Hands on Hartford facility, where we gained insight into the various programs dedicated to supporting the unhoused and food-insecure members of our community. The sheer scope of their initiatives left a lasting impression on us, demonstrating the tangible ways in which love and care can be extended to those in need.

A highlight of our day was hearing Ralph's personal story. Ralph bravely shared his experience of homelessness and the unique challenges he faced on his life's journey. His story served as a powerful reminder that homelessness can happen to anyone, reinforcing the importance of empathy and understanding in our efforts to build a more compassionate community.

With a newfound perspective, we embarked on a walk from Parkville to the Immacare shelter in the Frog Hollow section. Along the way, we received an education on the harsh realities faced by unhoused individuals as they navigate the streets in search of a safe place to sleep and survive. Our eyes were opened to the myriad obstacles they encounter such as fenced off areas of state property that block places of shelter under the highway and the tents that are camouflaged under trees and bushes in Pope Park; obstacles that most of us might take for granted in our daily lives.

Upon reaching the Immacare shelter, we were granted the opportunity to step into the shoes of those experiencing homelessness. The tour provided a firsthand look at shelter life, shedding light on the



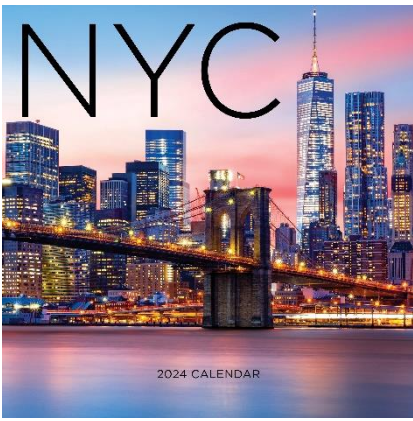
challenges individuals face in securing a place to rest, if only for a night or, for some, for a longer period. Witnessing these conditions firsthand left an indelible mark on our hearts, deepening our understanding of the harsh realities many face.

As we reflected on the day's experiences, our youth group unanimously expressed a sense of responsibility to make the world a better place for all of God's children. The knowledge gained, coupled with the newfound empathy and compassion in our hearts, has fueled a collective desire to take meaningful action within our community. May our shared commitment to compassion be a beacon of hope for those in need.
